SCT President's Corner

There has been a lot of activity going on in SCT since the Fall newsletter!

First and foremost, a lot of people have been busy (and continue to be busy!) pulling together the program for our **32nd Annual Meeting to be held May 15-18 in Vancouver, BC**. Dean Fergusson chaired the SCT Program Committee this year and the committee has done a fantastic job assembling a very full program. We received a record number of submitted abstracts from which the committee was able to identify a broad range

of excellent clinical trial presentations and posters. When the dust settled, we ended up with 100 contributed talks (compared to 70 last year), 30 invited talks (compared to 15 last year), and 120 posters (compared to 108 last year). There is something for all trialists, including sessions on information technology, regulatory issues, international issues, trial and statistical methodologies, trial coordination, industry issues, issues pertinent to CRAs and physicians, and safety issues, to name just a few!

In addition to the main meeting activities, on Sunday May 15 we once again will have a full day of Pre-Meeting Workshops. Chris Coffey chaired the SCT Education Committee and they have put together a very exciting program containing sessions that are geared to people new to clinical trials and to those who have worked on trials for a while, but may want to learn new skills or be exposed to topics outside of their usual areas.

Whew! We all need to thank Dean and Chris and the members of their committees for their hard work in developing the 'big picture' for the meeting. Thanks, people!

In addition to what I have outlined above, parts of the meeting will include special presentations and activities. For example, and described in this newsletter, SCT and Project ImpACT will once again present the Trial of the Year (ToTY) award. I thank Dave Sackett and the ToTY Committee for their work soliciting, reviewing, and selecting this year's winner. Jim Dignam and the Scholarship Committee have selected finalists for the Thomas Chalmers Student Scholarship Award and have selected a winner of the Sylvan Green Physician Scholarship Award. Thanks, people, for your hard work. Thanks also go to Marian Fisher and the Fellows Committee, which has selected the 2011 Class of SCT Fellows, as described in this newsletter, and to be announced on site in Vancouver.

Don't Miss these Speakers & Sessions in Vancouver

The SCT Program and Education Committees work in parallel paths to solicit and schedule quality education topics of interest to the variety of professionals who attend the Society's Annual Meeting. Both Committees spend months reviewing submissions and selecting the best ideas that offer solid foundational information in clinical trials and others that explore topics currently "hot" in many areas of study and practice.

The **2011 Program Committee**, chaired by Dean Fergusson of The University of Ottawa, is "pleased and excited to announce our wonderful program for Vancouver, British Columbia." The vast array of topics combined with exceptional speakers makes for an Annual Meeting not to be missed.

"Our calls for invited and contributed sessions were heard loud and clear, especially with respect to our international theme and special emphasis on Asia. With a 50% increase in invited session submissions and a 25% increase in contributed paper and poster submissions, the Program Committee had a very difficult task in selecting the best. More important than quantity, the quality of the submissions was outstanding. The Program Committee spent many hours grading and deliberating over the months of October,

November, and January. In the end, we capitalized on the quality of submissions by increasing the number of invited and contributed sessions."

A total of 30 Invited Sessions will be offered during the 2011 annual meeting, including five dedicated to our theme of international trials. Hot topic areas such as trials in the elderly, patient safety, ethical issues in cluster trials, and new guidance on missing data will showcase the depth and variety of talent that the Vancouver meeting has to offer. There will be approximately 20 contributed sessions comprising 100 speakers on a range of topics that will appeal to all those involved in clinical trials including data manager, research coordinators, investigators, and statisticians.

Of special interest are the six Invited Sessions featuring issues and challenges facing trialists in the developing and developed world. The following six "Don't Miss" sessions will be spread out over the entire meeting and comprise outstanding speakers from North America, Asia, Africa, and Europe:

- Conducting trials in Low and Middle-Income Countries: Challenges and Steps Forward.

Be sure not to miss two novel Invited Sessions dealing with issues around the conduct and interpretation of trials conducted in the elderly. The sessions, "How Polypharmacy Distorts Trial Evidence in Older Adults," and "Conducting Clinical Trials with Older Adults: Challenges and Strategies to overcome Obstacles," will be dynamic and sure to stimulate discussion.

The **2011 Education Committee**, led by Chris Coffey from the University of Iowa, is tasked with "booking talent" for the Pre-Meeting Workshops.

This Committee's hard work has resulted in 10 pre-meeting workshops in Vancouver selected to appeal to the diverse backgrounds of SCT members. The ever popular full-day workshop on Essentials of Randomized Clinical Trials is designed to

provide a comprehensive overview of clinical trials design, management, conduct, and analysis methods.

There are also half-day overview workshops that may particularly appeal to information technology specialists, program managers, and study coordinators. Those interested in statistical methodology can choose from half-day workshops on gene expression data, likelihood methods, non-inferiority studies, and adaptive clinical trials. Workshops that appeal to a broad spectrum of meeting attendees include those on small clinical trials and comparative effectiveness research.

Finally, there will be a workshop discussing regulatory issues for early clinical trials from the perspective of both the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and Health Canada. The all-star workshop faculty includes Simon Day, Kay Dickersin, and Janet Wittes.

The Society, and Committee Chairs Coffey and Fergusson would like to extend sincere thank-yous to the committee members (listed at right).

In his current position as Senior Director and Franchise Head for Vaccines, Late Development Statistics, Merck Research Laboratories, in Upper Gwynedd, PA, **Ivan Chan** describes his main research interests as "analysis of non-inferiority and equivalence trials; design, and analysis of clinical trials for vaccines; statistical inference using exact methods."

Ivan has been Chair of the Membership Subcommittee for FDA/Industry Section since 2009. He also has served on the Futures Committee, and led the Annual Meeting Program Committee in 2008. Trial of the Year: Jharkhand and Orissa Trial

Each year, the Society for Clinical Trials and Project ImpACT* present an award to the randomized clinical trial published (either electronically or in print) in the previous year that best fulfills the following standards:

- It improves the lot of mankind.
- It provides the basis for a substantial, beneficial change in health care.
- It reflects expertise in subject matter, excellence in methodology, and concern for study participants.
- It overcomes obstacles in implementation.
- The presentation of its design, execution, and results is a model of clarity and intellectual soundness.

This year's SCT/ImpACT Trial of the Year award (aka ToTY), the fourth to be awarded, is one among a crop of exceptional studies. Nominations came from Society members, investigators, and interested scholars from around the world. The selection committee, headed by David Sackett, included Kay Dickersin, Kyungman Kim, Steve Goodman and John Norrie. The initial list of nine nominees was quickly reduced to three finalists, all of which could have laid legitimate claim to the ToTY title.

The first of these was a study published in *The New England Journal of Medicine* looking at the effect of palliative care on

survival in advanced lung cancer. This trial, conducted at the Massachusetts General Hospital, randomized 151 patients to early palliative care together with standard oncologic therapy versus standard therapy alone. It produced the surprising result that not only was quality of life improved in the intervention group, but survival was extended by over two months (from 9 to 11.6). This was felt to be a worthy contender because of the importance of the question asked, the conduct of the trial, and the unexpected survival result.

The second finalist was published in *The Lancet*, known as the "Jharkhand and Orissa trial." It was a cluster randomized trial in very poor communities in eastern India, whose goal it was to reduce neonatal mortality rates and maternal depression. The investigators successfully randomized 36 districts to a community intervention (vs. none) which involved using or organizing village women's groups, who engaged in participatory learning and action through play, stories and games. Group members themselves identified newborn health problems within the community and selected their own strategies to address the problems, which they then implemented. After three years of the intervention, neonatal mortality was reduced by 45% and maternal depression by 57%.

The final study was the DART trial, also published in *The Lancet*. This study was a noninferiority trial of two different modes of monitoring HIV activity in Zimbabwe and Uganda. One group was randomized to routine laboratory monitoring, and the other to monitoring triggered by clinical events. The outcomes were Grade IV events or death. Clinically driven monitoring resulted in only a small increase in mortality, a modest increase in stage IV events, and was deemed to be an acceptable form of therapeutic monitoring.

While all of these RCTs were felt to have large potential impact, and to have evaluated important hypotheses, the consensus verdict was clear. The committee felt that the Jharkhand and Orissa trial was an extraordinary RCT, conducted with high quality in a very difficult setting, and achieving dramatic results of great public health importance. Perhaps most importantly, the study gave the participants and their communities tools to continue the intervention after the study was over. More details of this intervention and the trial will be shared at the Trial of the Year session at the Vancouver meeting by the principal investigator, Prasanta Tripathy, who will travel from India to represent the study and the organization Ekjut (www.ekjutindia.org), whose mission it is to improve maternal and neonatal outcomes in the poorest areas of India.

The committee was extremely pleased with the quality of the nominees, as well as with this year's winner. Do not miss the award session at the annual meeting on Tuesday afternoon!
